BHM: Trail Blazers! Robert C. Weaver and Patricia Roberts Harris



FIRST BLACK FEMALE CABINET MEMBER

- 1.) May 31, 1924—March 23, 1985 In 1943, she participated in one of the nation's first lunch counter sit-ins.
- 2.) She graduated from Howard University and the law school at George Washington University.
 3.) In 1963, President John F. Kennedy appointed her co-chairman of the National Women's Committee for Civil Rights.
- 4.) Serving as U.S. ambassador to Luxembourg from 1965 to 1967, she was the first African American woman to hold ambassadorial rank.
- 5.) From January 1977 to August 1979, she was the first African American woman to serve in the United States Cabinet as Secretary of HUD, and the first to enter the line of succession to the Presidency.
- **6.**) Patricia Roberts Harris served as Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.'s first Executive Director. In January 2000, she was honored on the 23rd commemorative stamp in the United States Postal Service's Black Heritage Series. Additionally, In 2003, Harris was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame.

FIRST BLACK CABINET MEMBER

- 1.) December 29, 1907 July 17, 1997
- 2.) Weaver received his B.A. and Ph.D. in economics from Harvard University.
- 3.) Throughout the New Deal era, Weaver served as an advisor on minority affairs in a number of federal agencies.
- 4.) In 1944, Weaver became director of the Commission on Race Relations in the Office of the Mayor of Chicago.
- 5.) In 1960, he became vice chairman of the New York City Housing and Redevelopment Board.
- 6.) The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) was created in September 1965, and Weaver became its first secretary the following January -- thereby becoming the first African-American appointed to a cabinet position.
- 7.) In 1969, after serving under President Johnson, Weaver became president of Baruch College. In 1970, Weaver became a distinguished professor of Urban Affairs at Hunter College in New York and taught there until 1978.





- **1) HBCUS DELIVER HIGHER RETURNS AT A LOWER COST.** Today, the nation's 106 HBCUs make up just 3 percent of America's colleges and universities, yet they produce almost 20 percent of all African American graduates and 25 percent of African American graduates in the STEM.
- **2) THEY MEET THE NEEDS OF LOW-INCOME, FIRST-GENERATION STUDENTS.** More than 70 percent of all students at HBCUs qualify for federal Pell Grants and 80 percent of HBCU students receive federal loans.
- **3) THE LOWER COSTS OF TUTION AND FEES HELP TO NARROW THE RACIAL WEALTH GAP.** By providing a best value in education, HBCUs help to eliminate or reduce student debt for low-to middle-income families, which could dramatically narrow the racial wealth gap between black and white households.
- **4) THE CAMPUS CLIMATE FOSTERS SUCCESS.** The Gallup-Purdue poll noted that black graduates of HBCUs are significantly more likely to have felt supported while in college and to be thriving afterward than their black peers who graduated from predominantly white institutions.
- **5) THEY ADDRESSES THE NATION'S UNDER- AND UNEMPLOYMENT CRISIS.** The nation needs HBCUs now more than ever given their proven track record of influencing the academic success of African Americans.
- **6) HBCUS OFFER A TRUE VALUE/VALUES PROPOSITION.** HBCUs are rooted in faith, community and service. Black churches have long been pillars of the black community and the history and life of black colleges are closely intertwined with faith, values and service to others; they are a great value to their students, but they also produce students with great values.

For more than 100 years, HBCUs have been educating minorities, giving them economic opportunities and instilling great values. Not only have they consistently produced leaders in their communities and across the nation, but HBCUs today are consistently and affordably producing the leaders of the future.

COVID-19 VACCINE INFORMATION-WHO CHOOSES WHO GETS VACCINATED FIRST

Tarrant County Public Health is now receiving shipments of the COVID-19 vaccine.

As directed by the Texas Department of State Health Services, Tarrant County Public Health; along with other Texas-based health entities, is providing vaccinations in phases. Vaccine appointments will first go to those most at risk of catching, spreading or dying from COVID-19. The initial groups are called Phase 1A and 1B (see below). If you are eligible, please sign up and you will be assigned an appointment as vaccine becomes available.

If you are not eligible at this time, you can still sign up and we will assign you a group as the State announces other phases. If you show up without an appointment, you will be turned away.

Because vaccine supply is currently limited and we're trying to provide a COVID-19 safe environment for all, there may be some lines outside to aid social distancing and further assure client safety. Please dress appropriately. If standing in line for an extended period of time is medically difficult, please speak to medical screeners on-site to make other arrangements.

Who chooses who gets vaccinated first:

Phase 1A First Tier

- 1. Paid and unpaid workers in hospital settings working directly with patients who are positive or at high risk for COVID-19. Such as but not limited to:
- a. Physicians, nurses, respiratory therapists and other support staff (custodial staff, etc.)
- b. Additional clinical staff providing supporting laboratory, pharmacy, diagnostic and/or rehabilitation services
- c. Others having direct contact with patients or infectious materials
- 2. Long-term care staff working directly with vulnerable residents. Includes:
- a. Direct care providers at nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and state supported living centers
- b. Physicians, nurses, personal care assistants, custodial, food service staff
- 3. EMS providers who engage in 9-1-1 emergency services like pre-hospital care and transport
- 4. Home health care workers, including hospice care, who directly interface with vulnerable and high-risk patients
- 5. Residents of long-term care facilities

Phase 1A Second Tier

- 1. Staff in outpatient care settings who interact with symptomatic patients. Such as but not limited to:
- a. Physicians, nurses, and other support staff (custodial staff, etc.)
- b. Clinical staff providing diagnostic, laboratory, and/or rehabilitation services
- c. Non-9-1-1 transport for routine care
- d. Healthcare workers in corrections and detention facilities
- 2. Direct care staff in freestanding emergency medical care facilities and urgent care clinics
- 3. Community pharmacy staff who may provide direct services to clients, including vaccination or testing for individuals who may have COVID
- 4. Public health and emergency response staff directly involved in administration of COVID testing and vaccinations
- 5. Last responders who provide mortuary or death services to decedents with COVID-19. Includes:
- a. Embalmers and funeral home workers who have direct contact with decedents
- b. Medical examiners and other medical certifiers who have direct contact with decedents
- 6. School nurses who provide health care to students and teachers

COVID-19 VACCINE INFORMATION-WHO CHOOSES WHO GETS VACCINATED FIRST (CONT.)

Phase 1B

People 65 years of age and older

People 16 years of age and older with at least one chronic medical condition that puts them at increased risk for severe illness from the virus that causes COVID-19, such as but not limited to:

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease or cardiomyopathies
- Solid organ transplantation
- Obesity and severe obesity (body mass index of 30 kg/m2 or higher)
- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease
- Type 2 diabetes mellitus

I am in one of the groups above, how do I register to receive my shot from Tarrant County Public Health and/or its partners?

We are scheduling individual appointments, it is preferred that each person registering uses an individual email address. If you only have one email address for the family, please create additional emails for each person. Learn more about free email accounts here

What happens once I receive an appointment?

You will receive information on your appointment through either text, phone, and/or text. Your appointment may be scheduled at any of our partner locations, please follow the instructions in your appointment message and arrive at the scheduled place and time.

There is no need to show up for your appointment more than 15-30 minutes in advance. When you show, be prepared to stand in line, but every effort is being made to avoid long lines. If you are physically unable to wait in line, please come to the front of the line and let the medical screeners know and they will make accommodations. Some lines may be outside.

What happens if I can't make my appointment?

Appointments cannot be rescheduled.

Please make every effort to show up on your appointment day. If you can't make your appointment day, please come the very next day.

Do I need to register for the second dose?

No. Your first registration covers that. You'll receive information on your second dose when you go to your first appointment.
